It's All About The Heart and Circulation Modeling

National Wear Red Day is but once a year. It helps raise awareness of the number one killer of women, heart disease. With it being the first Friday in February, you might say the date is already past. However, there is an ongoing battle for awareness and research all year long to help prevent death due to heart disease.

UAH is helping to battle this disease with the tireless research of Dr. Dawn Bardot of the Mechanical Engineering Department. The results of her research will help scientists evaluate the effects of atherosclerosis (heart disease), injured or damaged blood vessels, on the vascular system. In the future, Dr. Bardot hopes to help simulate the effects of drug delivery and valve stints on the system as well.

Dr. Bardot is constructing a

mechanical model of the circulatory system called a "Flow Phantom." Dr. Bardot explained that constructing a model for computational validation is much cheaper and a more robust method than performing tests in an experiment. The model that she is building is mechanically "Just a bunch of pipes...But computationally it is a vascular system." She described the amount of thought that needed to go into her model.

"[I must decide before I build,] how evolved does my model need to be?" She continued to explain that the answer to this question defines the type of system required. "[For example,] we are going to construct a healthy femoral artery and induce a basic hematoma. A bruise... With this information we want to find the boundary conditions [and make sure the data is valid]." This plan helps to direct the team as to the level of precision

required of the model.

These pipes are constructed with a special pump that acts as the heart would with a series of pipes that act as the arteries and veins. Different resistances are applied to the heart to simulate the valves. A series of electrical capacitors are also used to mimic the capillary bed's interaction with the system. A blood mimicking fluid will be used instead of real blood for a number of reasons.

Two reasons are that real blood coagulates due to foreign bodies - the plastic piping for example - and temperature. Blood is a Non-Newtonian fluid due to the red blood cells. When the blood is heated the cells become "rigid spheroids" but when it is at body temperature the cells are not rigid at all. At body temperature the blood acts similarly to a Newtonian fluid and that is why a Newtonian blood mimicking fluid can be used in the model.

This is helpful to Dr. Bardot and her team because a Newtonian Fluid is much easier to simulate than a Non-Newtonian Fluid. The software used to analyze the collected data will be Comsol Multiphysics. This software will analyze the mechanical characteristics of the fluid as well as the Thermal and Structural data.

She and her team plan to build the model this summer. In addition to this, undergraduate students and high school teachers, through the North Alabama Engineering Academy Alliance (the NAEAA) program in which UAH participates, will learn to use the flow circuit. They will do experiments as well as use the equipment and software.

University To Change MW Classes in Favor of MWF

Starting next fall, Monday/ Wednesday classes will no longer be offered to UAH students. In order to save money in an already tight budget, as well as make classes more accessible for students, the UAH administration has made a decision to offer classes only on Monday/Wednesday/Friday and Tuesday/Thursday.

"As many students know, there is currently a mix-up with the classes," said UAH Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs, Dr. Vistasp Karbhari. "Students can't always take all the classes that they want [or need], because the classes clash. We want to make it easier for students to access those classes."

Currently, UAH students often have to choose between two or more necessary classes, because the classes may be offered at the same time, or very close together. This problem often occurs when students are taking classes in more than one field of study, such as engineering and mathematics, for example. The new changes will seek to eliminate this problem.

Eliminating Monday/Wednesday classes will also make life easier on the UAH Registrar, and help them to keep track of any con-

flicts or clashes between classes that may arise. "It will improve the overall coordination capacity," said Dr. Karbhari. "While there will always be conflicts, we don't want an overlap."

"Classroom utilization on Friday is small," said Dr. Williams, UAH President. "This change also allows more options for teaching and allows more flexibility in the schedule."

Offering classes on Monday/ Wednesday/Friday and Tuesday/ Thursday is also more cost-efficient. Having more classes on Friday would also make more effi-

cient use of things that the univermust for pay anyway, such as electricity, heating and air conditioning. and other services that are provided to students.

How ever, while the change holds several benefits, not all UAH students are happy about it. Many UAH students attempt to leave their Fridays open for a multitude of reasons, perhaps to get in more hours at work, to study, or just simply to relax from a stressful week. "It makes it very hard for those students who [need to] to go to school as well as work," says one student, who wishes to remain anonymous.

Dr. Karbhari, welcomes any concerns that the students might have about this change, or anything else. "I can meet with groups of students or just one," says Dr. Karbhari. "It would be a pleasure."

Traveling Troupe Brings The Bard Back To UAH

The American Shakespeare Center brings the William Shakespeare plays "The Comedy of Errors" and "Hamlet," as well as the Tom Stoppard gem "Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead." to UAH from Feb. 18-20. The UAH stop is part of the Center's 2008/2009 Stark Raving

Sane Tour, performing throughout the eastern United States through March.

The first play, directed by Giles Block and described as "the perfect family show," is Shakespeare's shortest play, "The Comedy of Errors." The slapstick comedy relies on mistaken identity, telling the tale of two sets of twins, Antipholus of Syracuse and Antipholus of Ephesus, and Dromio of Syracuse and Dromio of Syracuse and Dromio of Ephesus. In the play, the twins, who were separated at birth, are reunited as adults, with farcical results. The play will be performed

plays. The tragedy centers on the doubt and indecision experienced by Hamlet, Prince of Denmark, as he contemplates avenging what a ghost claiming to be his father insists is his murder. In the end, Hamlet avenges his father's murder, but at the cost of his own life.

classic, "Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead," billed as a "companion piece" to Hamlet. In an interesting take on the Shake-speare play, the absurdist comedy presents the story of Hamlet from the point of view of two minor characters, Rosencrantz and Guildenstern, who, in the original play, are dispatched to shepherd Hamlet to England, where his father's murderer—his own stepfather—plans to have him killed. Stoppard's vision, however, makes the pair's mishaps the central action of the play


Maybe a little rough-housing is all you need to spice up your V-Day.

Then in a small bowl, combine 2 tbsp of sugar, ½ tsp of salt, 1 tsp of grated ginger root, ¼ tsp of pepper, ¼ cup of olive oil, and balsamic vinegar and stir with wire whisk until well blended. Pour over salad in bowl, and serve.

In a large saucepan, bring 2 cups of water to a boil. Add 1 pkg of any flavor ramen noodles and the flavor packet and cook for 5 minutes. Add 1 can of creamed corn, 1 cup of frozen corn, ¼ tsp ginger, ½ tsp curry powder, and ½ cup of milk. Heat over medium heat to a gentle simmer, and cook for 2-4 minutes; do not let the soup boil. Add grated cheese and stir until melted and the soup is blended.

Cauliflower Chicken Ramen Noodles



In another pot, boil 1 bag of frozen cauliflower until tender, and then drain and chop. Toss cauliflower in one teaspoon of olive oil, salt and pepper to taste. Pour cauliflower into the skillet with the chicken and toss to coat. Sprinkle chives over the top of the dish and add soy sauce to taste Serve over a bed of any flavor Ramen noodles.

Did you know that in Japan, it is common to find Noodle Shops almost on every street corner in major cities?

So for this Valentine's Day or National Single Awareness day, let's splurge and get that 60cent ramen and cook up a feast! I recommend Sapporo ICHIBAN who makes a mean oriental noodle over any ten cent ramen.

Note: For these recipes you will need to cook noodles according to package directions and drain all water (unless otherwise stated in recipes).

Antipasto Salad

1 pkg any flavor ramen noodles. Add ¼ cup of sliced pepperoni, ¼ cup of black or green olives and 1/8 cup of green sliced or red chopped onions. Sprinkle on Italian dressing (or olive oil/vinai-grette with freshly sliced basil) and toss.

Vegan Mexi-Ramen

1 package any flavored ramen noodles. Add 1 can of Rotel, ½ cup of black beans (drained), ½ cup of cut corn (not creamed), and top it with fresh chopped cilantro. Sour cream optional.

Ramen Thai

2 pkg Ramen Oriental with flavor packets, Do not drain. Add 2 Tbsp. soy sauce, 2 Tbsp. peanut butter, 1 Tbsp. brown sugar, 1/2 tsp. lemon peel or lemongrass, and 1/2 tsp. cayenne or hot sauce. Mix well. Garnish with chopped peanuts and a few chives.

Steak, Broccoli and Cheese Ramen

Cook 2 pkg of beef ramen. Add 1 cup chopped cooked broccoli. Mix 1 cup cooked chopped steak with 1 flavor pkt. and 1/2 jar Cheese Sauce. Add 1/4 tsp. garlic. Microwave for 20 seconds. Mix all ingredients.

Scallop Ramen Stir Fry

Heat 1 tbsp of olive oil in wok or large nonstick skillet over high heat. Add 3/4lb asparagus (cut into 1" pieces), 1 red bell pepper (cut into strips), 1 chopped onion and 2 cloves of minced garlic. Stir-fry 2 to 3 minutes or until vegetables are crisp-tender. Add 1 lb of sea scallops (cut in half) and stir-fry until white. Then Stir in (mix seasoning packet, 1 tbsp of soy sauce, 2 tbsp of lemon juice, 1 tsp of sesame oil and 1/8 tsp of hot sauce and noodles).

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
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
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Tennis Starts February 15th

Last year, the Lady Chargers had a magnificent record of 52-9, their season ending with a heart-breaking 1-0 loss to the University of Tampa in National Collegiate Athletics Association (NCAA) Division II South Region tournament. This year the Lady Chargers will also be trying to advance farther in the NCAA tournament and claim a national championship.

"All of the players want to win," said Johnson, who unfortunately will be missing this season due to a knee injury but is supportive of her team nonetheless. "It's just a matter of coming together."




Unable thwart UAH in the first two games, something must have happened to the Panthers overnight or the following morning,

Top: George Washington at bat. Below: Chase Earl pitching. (Photos by: Amber Rauschkolb)





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



a bargain price-only 15 cents a paper. The expense, though the amount of papers seems excessive, only totaled \$375. Originally, only students were able to obtain a paper, but by the second day, faculty and staff were allowed to purchase them for 15 cents.

Tallies held by the Information Desk staff suggest that at least 350 newspapers were distributed. Whether UAH students' interest in history is minimal or Smith overestimated student demand, the numbers are a little disheartening.

Taralyn Caudle, Coordinator of Service Learning and Volunteer Services, is turning the oversight into something productive. She is taking the remaining papers to public school children in the Huntsville area. So far, the papers have been dropped off at University Place Elementary School, Terry Heights Elementary School, and Ed White Middle School. Other hopeful recipients include Girls Incorporated of Huntsville and the Boys and Girls Club of Huntsville/Madison

Caudle's reasons for donating them to school children is that the event is historically significant and those students whose families do not read the newspaper now have the opportunity to read it.

Smith, too, is making efforts to distribute the remaining papers to residence halls. She hopes that students who had not heard about the inaugural gift will still be able to obtain their own piece of presidential history.
