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
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

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
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GENERAL INFORMATION



Mission Statement

The University of Alabama in Huntsville is a campus of The University of Alabama System. It is a teaching and research institution dedicated to excellence in the promotion of the intellectual, technological, and economic enhancement of the region, state and nation. The University offers a wide range of academic and professional majors at the bachelor's and master's levels and a specialized selection of doctoral level programs.

The University is committed to developing a faculty of the highest quality, and to providing an environment which facilitates its continued intellectual and professional growth. The University Faculty is, in turn, committed to stimulating the intellectual development of its students.

The institution recognizes its responsibility to prepare its students to take leadership roles, think creatively and critically, and communicate clearly; to respect knowledge and the pursuit of truth; and to engage in the challenge and pleasure of a lifetime of learning. Because of its location in a technologically oriented major population center, UAH offers educational opportunities for traditional students and those individuals who are beyond the traditional college age.

UAH recognizes its responsibilities to the Huntsville community and the surrounding region, one of the nation's key centers for governmental and industrial advanced technological research. In meeting those responsibilities the institution provides unusual opportunities for new and creative programs, especially in science, engineering, primary care medicine, and related areas. A Brief History

ORGANIZATION

In 1950, The University of Alabama in Huntsville initiated its academic program as an extension center of The University of Alabama.

In September 1966, the Huntsville Campus became The University of in Huntsville, an official branch of The University of Alabama.

In 1969, The University of Alabama System was reorganized to provide for the three autonomous campuses, each with a president.

INSTRUCTION and DEGREES

In 1963, the Huntsville Campus initiated programs leading to graduate degrees to be awarded in Huntsville. In 1964, the first graduate degree was awarded in Huntsville.

In 1964, the Huntsville Campus initiated degree programs leading to the bachelor's degree to be awarded in Huntsville.

In 1968, the first bachelor degrees earned at UAH were awarded in Tuscaloosa. Degrees were awarded in Huntsville the following year.

In 1971, doctoral programs were initiated at UAH.

The School of Primary Medical Care began its medical student and residency programs in Fall 1973.

STUDENTS

In 1964, the first full-time freshman class was enrolled at the Huntsville campus.

RESEARCH

In June 1961, Dr. Wernher von Braun addressed the Alabama legislature and asked for funding of a research institute on the Huntsville campus. The Research Institute Building was occupied in July 1964.

ACCREDITATION

The University of Alabama in Huntsville received separate accreditation from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools in 1970.

Measures of Academic Excellence 1987-88

- The University of Alabama in Huntsville continues to attract very well qualified students. The Fall 1987 mean composite of ACT scores for fulltime freshmen was 22.2, compared to 19.2 average for freshmen nationwide.
- 2. While enrolled at the University, undergraduate and graduate students have set high standards of academic achievement:
 - a. The Alabama College Co-op and Placement Association selected Francis C. Wessling as the 1988 Alabama Co-op of the Year. Frank was chosen from nominations made by participating Alabama colleges. Selection was based on academics, three employer letters of recommendation, the UAH Co-op Director recommendation, and a student statement. Frank was an electrical engineering Co-op at BDM Corporation in Huntsville.
 - b. Student-athlete GPA's are consistently stronger than the total student population at UAH. During the fall term, 33% of all athletes were on the honor scholar list, boasting a GPA of 3.0 or better. This is in comparison to 17.4% of all students at UAH being named to the honor scholar list for the fall term.
 - c. A milestone was made this past year when the UAH crew team won a national championship at the Dad Vail Regatta. The win signified the first time ever for UAH to bring home this distinction as a varsity sport. The two man crew with coxswain beat Canisius College by four seconds in the 2,000 meter course. Rowers were Tim Le Duc, a senior Engineering major and Steve Burrows, a senior Commercial Art major. Coxswain was Teresa Wolfsberger, a junior Engineering major.
 - d. Everett E. Brooks, Jr., a senior Electrical Engineering major, is currently the Chairperson for the Southeastern Region of the National Society of Black Engineers. This Region comprises all the schools that have NSBE charters in the states of Kentucky, Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia and Florida.
 - e. Steven Paley, a senior majoring in chemistry, was awarded an I.B.M. Graduate Fellowship worth \$14,000 per year to pursue his graduate training in chemistry. He has chosen to do that work at UAH.
 - f. Joseph Alexander, a new undergraduate student in physics, has been awarded a four-year full scholarship because of his outstanding performance at the 1987 International Science Fair held in Puerto Rico.

- g. Huei Peng, a doctoral student in physics, in collaboration with Professor D. G. Torr of the Physics Department, received an Honorable Mention for his essay "Effects of a Superconductor on Gravitomagnetic Fields and the Potential Effect on the Gyroscope Experiments." This essay was entered in a world-wide competition sponsored by the Gravity Research Foundation. The competition attracts papers on contemporary gravitation research from leading universities around the world.
- h. Richard Boehme, a medical student in the School of Primary Medical Care, completed all requirements for the M.D. degree (The University of Alabama School of Medicine) and for the Ph.D. in Biomedical Engineering (UAB) in a single four-year period. Dr. Boehme has entered the General Surgery Residency at Betheseda Naval Hospital and will subspecialize in neurosurgery.
- i. Susan Steinhoff, a junior in Nursing, was the state's only recipient of an Alabama League for Nursing Scholarship funded by the Southeast Alabama Medical Center.
- j. Franklyn Davies, a 24 year old Civil Engineering major, was awarded the prestigious American Society of Civil Engineers Award (ASCE). He received a plaque and a \$250 check. A native of Freetown, Sierra Leone, he is also a member of the Charger Soccer Team.









Career Planning and Placement Summary of 1987-88 Recruitment and Placement Activities


In its activities with candidates seeking degreed entry-level employment, Career Planning and Placement served 216 Administrative Science candidates, 34 Liberal Arts candidates, 159 Engineering candidates, 34 Science candidates, and 2 Nursing candidates. Forty-three percent of the organizations recruiting UAH candidates dealt with the service industries; 43% in manufacturing /research and development; and 16% in government. Fifty-nine percent of all organizations recruiting UAH candidates were located in Madison County; 20% in other Alabama counties; 15% in the southeastern U.S.; and 6% were outside the southeast U.S.



Undergraduate Departmental Headcount Enrollment Fall 1987-88





Cooperative Education Program

History

A small cooperative education (Co-op) program existed from 1973 until August 1979. In August of 1979 sixty-nine (69) students were enrolled in an undergraduate Co-op program.

In August 1979 the UAH President directed a revitalization of Co-op at UAH. Responsibility was assigned to the Vice President for Academic Affairs and a Co-op staff was hired. Since August 1979 the UAH program has grown from 69 students to an unduplicated head count of 475 for the 1987-88 academic year.

The Current Program

Co-op is offered to our better students, 2.5 QPA and higher on a 4.0 scale. The current job market in Huntsville results in engineers and natural science students being in greatest demand for Co-op jobs.

Co-op is offered at undergraduate and graduate levels.

All Co-op jobs must be directly related to the student's academic major. The primary objective is to provide the student with career related experience.

All Co-op jobs are for pay. Pay is determined by fair value for the job level and skills of the student.

Most students alternate terms of work with full-time school. A student enrolled in the Co-op program is considered to be enrolled full-time on the alternating work terms. Special cases for nursing students, and selected others, permit the use of "parallel" Co-op, i.e., work part-time during a school term.

The Co-op program is totally funded by the University.

Results


In the 1987-88 academic year 475 Co-op students participated in paid work experiences directly related to their academic major.


UAH Co-ops earned \$2,394,323.81. This allowed many students to continue college who otherwise would not have had the opportunity to do so. In addition, the students paid their share of Federal and State taxes on these earnings.

Co-op employers offered permanent employment to the majority of the graduating Co-op students. Thus, Co-op not only satisfies the employers' need, but also retains most graduates in North Alabama.

The UAH Co-op Program is the largest in the University of Alabama System.



Comparison of Total Fall Term Headcount to Fall Term Student Full-time Equivalency (using ACHE FTE definition) 1983-1987





School of Primary Medical Care Medical Student Program

The UAH School of Primary Medical Care began its medical student program in the fall of 1973, a year ahead of schedule, with students who came from Birmingham on electives of one or two months. The first group of full-time medical students in Huntsville came to the School of Primary Medical Care as juniors in the fall of 1974 and graduated from The University of Alabama School of Medicine in 1976.

All 283 graduates of The University of Alabama School of Medicine classes of 1976 through 1988 who have spent their junior and senior years at The University of Alabama in Huntsville have been placed in residency programs; all but 18 out of 283 matched with one of their preferred residency choices. Two hundred five of these 283 graduates (72%) have selected residencies usually classified as primary care (family practice, internal medicine, pediatrics, obstetrics/gynecology, flexible).

On the examinations given by the National Board of Medical Examiners, the Huntsville-based students of The University of Alabama School of Medicine have scored at the national average and at the same average as the Birmingham-based students.

The University of Alabama School of Medicine has been visited four times by the Liaison Committee on Medical Education, the national accrediting agency, since the school became a tri-campus program. On all visits, the LCME found no problems with the Huntsville curriculum and gave the Huntsville program positive reports.

School of Primary Medical Care UAH-Huntsville Hospital Family Practice Residency Program

The Family Practice Residency Program of The University of Alabama in Huntsville and Huntsville Hospital was the first approved and first fully accredited residency in family practice in Alabama. The first resident began the three-year program in November 1973. The program is accredited for a total of thirty-six residents, twelve in each of the three years of the residency.

One hundred thirteen of the one hundred nineteen physicians who have completed the UAH-Huntsville Hospital Family Practice Residency Program through June 1988 are practicing in the South. Ninety-four of the one hundred nineteen graduates (79%) are practicing in Alabama and adjoining states (Georgia, Mississippi, Tennessee).

School of Primary Medical Care EMT-Paramedic Program

Professionally trained and state certified paramedics are full-fledged allied health professionals who work closely with physicians in providing emergency medical care. An adequate supply of paramedics is particularly important for rural areas. The UAH Paramedic program is the only such program serving Colbert, DeKalb, Jackson, Lauderdale, Limestone, Madison and Marshall counties in northern Alabama. To make paramedic training possible for statelicensed EMT-Intermediates working in these counties, the UAH Paramedic Program offers instruction at Guntersville, Scottsboro and Sheffield in addition to classes held in Huntsville.

The Emergency Medical Technician-Paramedic Program has been functioning since 1978. The program has been training state-licensed EMT-Intermediates in general pharmacology and specific pharmacology, including both the national standard drugs and certain specific drugs that are approved for pre-hospital use by the State Committee on Public Health. Students are also trained in emergency psychological care, emergency respiratory and cardiac care, emergency childbirth, and pediatric situations. Upon successful completion of the training program, the student is eligible for a national license as an EMT-Paramedic and is capable of rendering advanced cardiac life support in the pre-hospital setting under the direct voice contact of a duly licensed physician.

Since 1978, 229 persons have begun the EMT-Paramedic program with 189 reaching successful completion and obtaining EMT-Paramedic licensure. Currently, 11 students are enrolled in the program (Summer, 1988).

The UAH EMT-Basic program (established in 1980) provides experience in which the student can learn basic life support skills, trauma care, basic patient management and automobile extrication. Successful completion of this course allows the student to take a state licensure exam for an EMT-Basic license. Since 1980, 404 students have been enrolled with 375 being eligible for licensure as EMT-Basics. Currently, 12 students are enrolled in the program (Summer, 1988).

In 1984, the program initiated an EMT-Intermediate level of training. This program provides experience in which the student can learn advanced life support skills, which include intravenous therapy, advanced airway management, advanced cardiac skills and advanced trauma management. Successful completion of this course allows the student to take a state licensure exam for an EMTintermediate license. To date, 111 have enrolled in the course, with 101 being eligible for licensure as EMT-Intermediates. Currently, 20 students are enrolled in the program (Summer, 1988).

The EMT-Paramedic program has also been actively involved in offering continuing education classes for all levels of EMT's, nurses and physicians. Since 1979, 1,059 persons have taken part in the various offerings. Continuing education offerings are planned throughout the year.

School of Primary Medical Care EMT-Paramedic Program (continued)

In April, 1984, the UAH EMT-Paramedic program became the second such program in Alabama and the third in the Southeast to become accredited through the American Medical Association. To date, the Division of Allied Health Education and Accreditation has accredited only forty-four EMT-Paramedic programs out of 400 such programs nationwide. The AMA accrediting committee has asked UAH to allow other EMT-Paramedic programs to be able to use our lesson plans as an instructional model if called upon.

School of Primary Medical Care Patient Care

Medical students and residents must receive their clinical education in the patient care setting. The School of Primary Medical Care provides such patient care at the UAH Medical Clinics, the Huntsville Hospital, the Fox Army Community Hospital at Redstone Arsenal, and other area hospitals and health agencies. Since the opening of the Family Practice Center, there have been approximately 480,000 patient visits to the UAH Medical Clinics and its satellite clinics. In the past four years, the School's faculty and residents cared for about 4,850 patients on the medicine service at Huntsville Hospital and in the past seven years have managed more than 5,215 obstetrical deliveries.

The School provides a number of special patient care programs that save lives and reduce disabilities throughout the thirteen North Alabama counties of Colbert, Cullman, DeKalb, Franklin, Jackson, Lauderdale, Lawrence, Limestone, Madison, Marion, Marshall, Morgan, and Winston.

Among the many services provided citizens of North Alabama, those available through the UAH Medical Clinics and the Newborn Intensive Care Unit of Huntsville Hospital are vitally important to this region. 1987-88 patient care statistics for these programs are as follows:
