- 3. Cruella De Vil was inspired by Huntsville native Tallulah Bankhead.
- 4. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. visited and spoke at the Church Street Community, an all Black community once located downtown.
- 5. Susan B. Anthony and Carrie Chapman spoke here during the suffrage movement.

Key Findings/Results

By the end of our research, we concluded that the nickname "Rocket City" is limiting to what Huntsville has to offer for its citizens and visitors. There are numerous stories, artifacts, and historical significances hiding in the shadow of Saturn V.
